Jubilee Pasture

A community project to create a special place for people and wildlife

Halfway between Bugthorpe and Kirby Underdale, where the road crosses the beck, there is a triangle of grassland bordered by trees. In 2022, Halifax Estates supported the idea of a community project to transform this site into a small wildlife haven and create a special place where local residents and visitors can appreciate our countryside. The project commemorated The Queen's Platinum Jubilee, being located next to Pasture Farm, Jubilee Pasture was created.

Bugthorpe and Kirby Underdale Parish Council received generous funding from the National Lottery Heritage Fund and work began in 2022. The initial development of Jubilee Pasture was managed by a core team of volunteers with representatives of Halifax Estates, Bugthorpe and Kirby Underdale Parish Council, Bugthorpe War Memorial Institute and the farm tenants of the site. Much of the work was undertaken by members of the community who signed up as 'Friends of Jubilee Pasture' and turned up at volunteer sessions to plant, sow, cut and - a highlight - spread green hay to introduce locally sourced wildflower seeds across the meadow area. Children and staff at Bugthorpe C of E Primary School have also made an important contribution, planting out many plants grown from locally collected seed. The enthusiasm of these volunteers is a key part of what makes Jubilee Pasture special.

Jubilee Pasture has also benefited greatly from the generosity of local people who used their expertise and equipment to undertake specialist tasks. For example, cutting the hay meadow, providing and transporting green hay, erecting owl and bat boxes, creating and installing an inscribed bench from reclaimed stone, designing an interpretation board with a painted panoramic view of the landscape, and positioning large stones around the pond. The project would not have been successful without their contributions. The project has been underpinned by support from Halifax Estates, which is much appreciated. Thank you to everyone who has helped in any way.

Jubilee Pasture is an asset for people and wildlife lasting long into the future. Everyone is welcome to visit, read the information board, sit on the bench and enjoy the beauty and peace found here. Rainfall

Rainfall for November 2023 and December 2023 in Bishop Wilton.

Rainfall for November 129.3mm (average rainfall November 2003-2022 76mm)

Rainfall for December 150.6 mm (average rainfall December 2003-2022 71.5mm)

Rainfall for 2023 total 1040.8 mm (average yearly rainfall 2003-2021 752.1 mm).

November was the third wettest November that I have recorded in the last 21 years and was only 8mm less than the November record set in 2022.

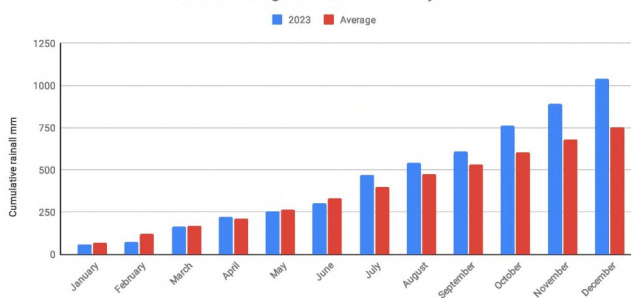
December was the wettest December I have recorded with 150mm (six inches) of rain.

The yearly total of 1040.8mm (nearly 42 inches) of precipitation was the highest yearly total that I have recorded- surpassing the 1020mm recorded in 2012.

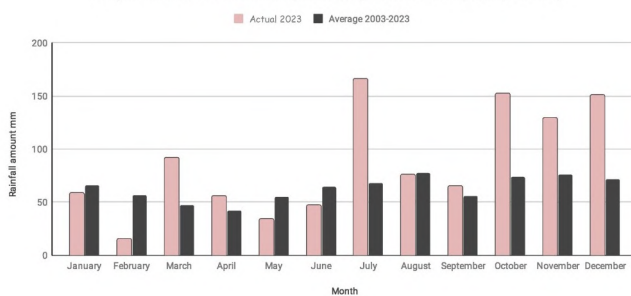
Unsurprisingly, Autumn (September, October and November) 2023 has also been a record breaking year in regards to the amount of rainfall with 346.7mm (nearly 15 inches).

One notable aspect of 2023 was the sheer amount of rain that has fallen in the last six months of the year. An "average" amount for the July-December period is 421.9mm (nearly 17 inches). This year four of the last six months exceeded 100mm and a total of 739mm (nearly 30 inches) of rain has fallen. This is nearly an average yearly amount of rain (for BW) in the last six months. There is no wonder that the ground is saturated and the stream through the village is running with renewed vigour!

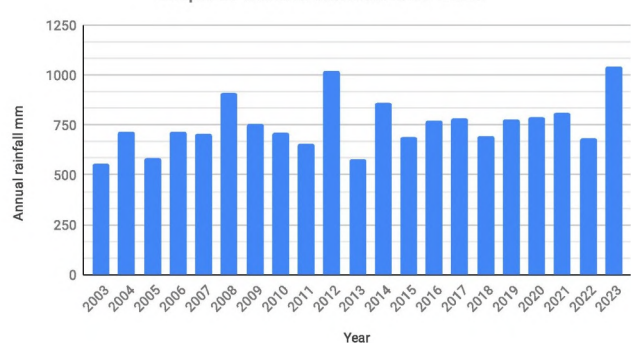
2023 and Average cumulative monthly rainfall

A Wilton Childhood: Part Three by Norman Foster

Bonfire night was always a highlight of the year with the unofficial best bonfire being built on the waste ground on Vale Crescent.

We would build it from old fallen branches, crates, boxes, old furniture and anything that was vaguely flammable. It grew and grew in size the days before the big night until it was truly enormous. Someone usually made a Guy from some of Dad's old clothes and we were ready to go. The rain never stopped the occasion either as, if it was wet, we would scrounge cans of waste oil and paraffin from Herris Fisher and that always got the damp heap alight. Health and Safety - eat your heart out!

One lovely memory is the Yorkshire parkin made by Mrs Burgess, or Auntie Burgess as most of us called her. Delicious on the night.

Fireworks were available prior to Bonfire Night from the Post Office shop near the Fleece that was owned by Charlie Stott and his wife Gladys. These fireworks were not as spectacular as the ones nowadays but they did the job. Penny bangers were a bit tame but the threepenny ones had a bit of welly. Of course, even these were not enough for some of us so we would cannibalise them and try to manufacture our own with mixed results. Sometimes just a big fizz and occasionally a really good bang.

Even better was the explosion made by calcium carbide bought from Alan Ripley. Alan had an old shed at the rear of his field in Back Lane from which he sold cycle spares and even the odd bike. In years gone by, bike lights had been illuminated by acetylene made by mixing carbide and water. He still had a plentiful supply of the stuff that looked like grey gravel and in an old coffee can it would make a really good explosion.

We could buy small rockets for three old

pennies. They would only travel short distances. They were okay but not riveting. So, one of my best mates, Arthur Cook, and I dreamt up a variation for their use. Arthur had a hollow metal gatepost that was removeable from its mounting. We would hold it across our shoulders, put

the newly lit rocket down the length of it and aim at strategic targets. Unsurprisingly, when the adults got wind of it we were banned from this home-made bazooka. We reckoned that the chap on his bike who had had a missile zap across his path had grassed us up.

Looking back on all this mayhem, it was extremely dangerous and it was a miracle that none of us were injured.

When I was young the main village shop was the Co-op. In the early fifties I remember going there with my mum and her war-time ration book. In those days, the shop was managed by a chap called Mr Sid Fielder who constantly whistled. He had two assistants, his daughter Doreen and later one of my cousins by marriage, Mavis Ward. Mr Fielder retired when I was in me early teens and the shop was taken over by Alec Lecuas who was a lovely man and didn't whistle.

Mr Lecuas gave me my first part-time job as a general worker and delivery boy. The work was usually sweeping and bagging up flour and sugar for sale but the main part was delivering orders each evening after school and on Saturday morning. 17 shillings and sixpence a week. Luxury.

The work was fun and pretty easy. Even though some of the orders were immense. I remember a weekly order for a large wonderful family, the Brighams, in Vale Crescent. Uphill all the way on a heavy shop-bike with no gears. Hard work but still enjoyable.

From Mike: Central to all traditions of faith and belief is the idea of thankfulness or gratitude. We all too easily go through life missing the miracles of each day. What the writer Zig Zigler calls an “attitude of gratitude” is an antidote to missing each day’s special moments. A meditation that goes by the name “the three blessings exercise” developed by the psychologist Martin Seligman is a way of cultivating an attitude of gratitude that can be helpful irrespective of our particular spiritual tradition. The idea is to spend a few moments at the end of each day thinking back on the day and being explicitly thankful for three things or people or situations that have happened. After identifying them for each one just spend a moment going a little deeper and become aware of some of the things that make them possible which may include the gifts of other people. So if you are being thankful for a nice meal it naturally leads to thanksgiving for the people who enabled the food to be on the table and the wider creation. If you think about how special seeing the new moon is, this leads to a thankfulness for all our senses and the time to appreciate looking up in wonder. For some people actually writing this down in a gratitude journal can deepen the impact of this practice. In studies just doing this for a month can be as effective as a way tackling feelings of depression. At a time like this when the news can seem overwhelmingly bleak it is all too easy to lose yourself in feelings of negativity and powerlessness so having something to do that is a reminder of the good and wondrous in each day can make a real difference. It has certainly been something that has helped me “when the going gets tough”.

Linda writes: This issue of the Pump covers Lent and Easter with it being early this year. I hope you have a very Happy Easter and draw hope from the Easter story that is all about light and life overcoming darkness.

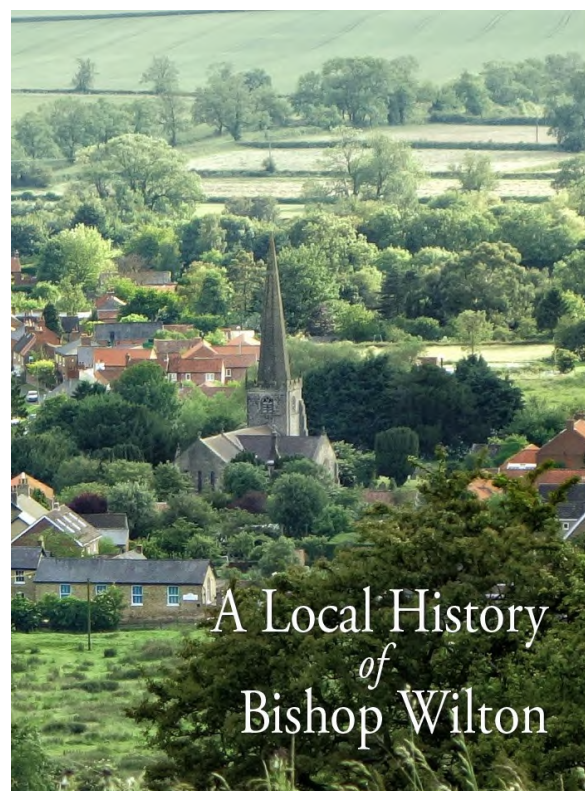

Parish Council of Bugthorpe and Kirby Underdale

Minutes of the 162nd Meeting of the Parish Council held at Bugthorpe War Memorial Institute on Monday 11 December 2023

Present: Councillors: D J Pearson (Chair)

Lady Halifax, D Birks, R Crow, H T Paul, F Goodhart, T Atkinson, D Curtis, D J Lord

In attendance: Ward Councillor Hammond

These minutes are currently draft pending approval or amendment at the next Parish Council meeting.

1. Apologies for absence were received from Councillor Robinson.

2. Minutes of the Meeting held on Monday 11 September 2023 were approved and signed as a true record, by the Chair, with one amendment being the Chair had mentioned that when decorators were painting the exteriors of Post Office Row in Kirby Underdale, they should be careful not to dislodge the house martin nests.

3. Declarations of Interest - the Parish Councils (Model Code of Conduct) Order 2001. There were no declarations of interest.

4. Matters Arising from the last Meeting:

a) Jubilee Pasture - the Chair reported that the end of project report has been submitted to the National Lottery Heritage Fund. The project was delivered on time and with an underspend of £450.49. The Clerk confirmed that during the recent very heavy rain the pond dam was breached and will need to be repaired in the Spring. The Committee has discussed the possibility of incorporating more stones to create a weir rather than a dam with pipes running through it, which are always going to be prone to blocking. With a weir the water level that was achieved with the dam can be maintained. The Clerk is to decide on site with Councillor Atkinson how the work is going to be undertaken. This will be funded by Halifax Estates as National Lottery will not allow surpluses to be carried forward. However, it was agreed that if National Lottery do not reclaim the £450.49 underspend, this could be utilised for the pond repair.

b) Dog fouling in Bugthorpe & Kirby Underdale - Councillor Crow said that dog fouling in Bugthorpe is still happening on a regular basis, but Chair said that the situation had improved in Kirby Underdale. Councillor Hammond suggested that the Dog Warden could be brought in to resolve the issue in Bugthorpe. Councillor Crow mentioned that the Parish Council have previously avoided bringing in the Dog Warden before who would recommend a proliferation of

signs and potentially stencils on the footpaths, together with bins. After further discussion it was agreed not to contact the Dog Warden at the present time but to keep trying to influence and educate the dog owners in Bugthorpe responsible for this problem.

c) Speed limit signs for Stephenwath Lane - Councillor Crow reported that designs have been received from the Bugthorpe School pupils and Signs Express have quoted £35 + VAT for two 450mm square signs. Councillor Atkinson was asked to proceed with the order for the signs and for them to be invoiced to the Parish Council.

d) Broadband provision and mobile phone coverage in Kirby Underdale - the Clerk confirmed that there is significant dissatisfaction with the Quickline service to properties in Kirby Underdale and surrounding areas. However, Quickline have confirmed that they can only respond to individual customer reports in an attempt to improve the service. The Clerk and Councillor Hammond confirmed that the Government initiative Project Gigabit is being rolled out across Yorkshire. There are currently three phases in the pipeline being:

Lot 8 West Yorkshire & York

Lot 20 South Yorkshire

Lot 23 East Yorkshire & Lincolnshire.

Lot 8 is currently in procurement and the build is due to commence in early 2024. The scope for this lot has not yet been finalised but will hopefully cover Bugthorpe and Kirby Underdale, because of their proximity of York. The contracts are to be let this month, so Councillor Hammond will soon find out whether Bugthorpe and Kirby Underdale are included and will keep the Parish Council informed.

The Clerk confirmed that under Ofcom's Universal Service Obligation (USO) all residential properties are legally entitled to have both a phone and broadband connection so no disconnection of the copper lines will happen until after the VoIP (Voice over Internet Protocol) has been installed for all communities. Councillor Hammond confirmed that after Project Gigabit has been completed there will be remaining 5% properties that do not have a fibre connection. These are likely to be the outlying farms and isolated properties. East Riding of Yorkshire Council have set aside £2.5m to provide a service to these properties. Alternatives such as 4G and 5G for remote properties has been looked at. The Chair confirmed that Openreach have a scheme as well. It was decided to wait for the outcome of the Project Gigabit procurement to establish whether Bugthorpe and Kirby Underdale are in

Lot 8, so that a time scale can be put on the fibre connections and a decision can be made whether to pursue other avenues.

e) Restoration of Uncleby Tap - Councillor Atkinson confirmed that Halifax Estates have not yet had time to carry out the repair, but this is planned for the Spring. All Councillors were happy with this.

f) Pedestrian bridge across Beck at Low Hall - the Clerk reported that East Riding of Yorkshire Council have assessed the bridge and deemed it sound therefore we do not plan to do any work on it for the foreseeable future. Councillors agreed that this assessment is wrong as there is a missing section of guard rail with the resultant risk to the public. Councillor Hammond agreed to take this up with the Rights of Way Department.

g) Kirby Underdale Village Hall refurbishment - the Clerk reported that the new heaters have been installed which are very effective. The reclaimed kitchen from School Barn is to be fitted over the next few weeks, which will be a marked improvement on what is there now.

Halifax Estates will knock a doorway through the entrance hall to access a new wooden storage shed for tables and chairs. This will be done Jan/Feb 2024. Additional decoration and dressing of the hall will be coordinated by Lord Halifax and Lady Joanna Morton-Jack.

The Chair said that the PIR operated light on the Village Hall is creating disturbance for him and his family School Farmhouse. It was agreed to disable the PIR so that the light is operated by an external switch only.

h) Planning and Listed Building Application for School Barn, Kirby Underdale- The Clerk reported that the applications were approved at the Planning Committee meeting on 28 November, by the majority of 10 Councillors in favour and only 1 against. This was a total reversal from when the applications were initially considered in July when there was the majority of 10 to 1 voting for refusal. The Clerk confirmed that the support of the Ward Councillors had been influential. Work will start on the garden room extension in January 2024.

i) Community Governance Review - Councillor Hammond confirmed that after the next Council elections in May 2027, Bugthorpe and Kirby Underdale will become one Parish and the present 10 Councillors will not change following the representation of the Parish Council.

j) Salt Bins - the Clerk reported that 400kg green salt bin is due to be delivered for Beck Row. The Stephenwath Lane has been replaced and the bin near the Kirby Underdale Village Hall, which is

timber, which has been retained and will be serviced by East Riding of Yorkshire Council. As ERYC are not supplying the Beck Row salt bin, it will be the responsibility of the Parish Council to service it and the Clerk confirmed that the cost of the salt will £5.61 for an order of 40 no. 25kg bags. These can be stored at Garrowby Sawyard and the bin replenished as necessary. Approval was given for salt purchase.

k) Travellers on A166- the Clerk reported that the tenant at Cot Nab Farm, Mark Megginson, has not been bothered by the travellers. However, following confirmation that there are no welfare concerns, East Riding of Yorkshire Council have initiated a process of moving the travellers on.

5. Other Matters.

a) Parish Council Precept 2024-25 in the sum of £4,300 was agreed. The Precept Form was signed by the Chair and Clerk.

b) Approval was given for the following payments and cheques signed by the Chair and Clerk:

Zurich Municipal Insurance £257.60

G Sissons half year bus shelter cleaning £65.00

Halifax Estate - Rembursement for salt £194.34

c) Draft devolution deal for Hull and East Riding - Councillor Hammond confirmed that during the consultation, the preference was for a mayoral authority. This is potentially worth up to £900m to East Riding infrastructure/ education and adult services.

There will be a new public consultation in the New Year for a period of two months. There will be a list of questions for participants to answer and if the proposal is approved it could get through Government processes by mid-summer 2024, if the General Election is delayed until October. If the General Election is brought forward to May, the Devolution deal will be delayed by at least 2 years. There could be a Mayoral Election in May 2025. Councillor Hammond urged Councillors to support the proposal.

d) Planning Application for stable block and hay store at Waterloo Cottage, Uncleby. Councillor Goodhart expressed concerns about security, but the Clerk and Councillor Atkinson said that various security measures could be put in. Councillor Atkinson confirmed that the proposed stable block will not be seen from the road due to the tall hedge.

Councillors had no objections to this proposal.

e) Annual Rough Sleeper Survey 2023 - it was noted that this has been completed and submitted.

f) Community Litter Pick 2024 - the Clerk said that the turnout had been disappointing this year and therefore it was agreed that next year the event needs to be publicised better. The Clerk is to suggest some days in March.

g) Request for donation to Poppy Appeal. The Clerk read out the request for a donation to the Poppy Appeal. Councillor Crow thought that the War Memorial Institute should make the donation rather than the Parish Council and would discuss this with the Institute Committee. In the meantime, the Clerk is to enquire how much other Parish Councils have been donating.

6. Correspondence -No comments were made.

7. Any Other Business.

a) The Clerk confirmed that a parishioner has recently complained about the grips on Uncleby Hill. Councillors agreed that grips are extremely important to take water off the road.

b) The Clerk reported that Stamford Bridge is going to be closed in April 2024 for repairs, for a period of 8-10 weeks.

c) Councillor Crow said that he was asked to raise the possibility of having Uncleby Hill on the precautionary salting route. The Clerk said that he has argued for this before but been unsuccessful. However, he will make the request again. Councillor Hammond said that it was unlikely that Uncleby Hill will be included due to budgetary constraints.

d) Councillor Goodhart requested that when Garrowby Hill is closed, traffic should not be diverted through Kirby Underdale and Bugthorpe as the roads are unsuitable. Councillor Hammond agreed to raise this with the Highway Department.

8. Date of Next Meeting.

The next meeting was fixed for 7pm on Monday 11 March 2024 at Kirby Underdale Village Hall. There being no further business, the Meeting was closed at 8.33pm.

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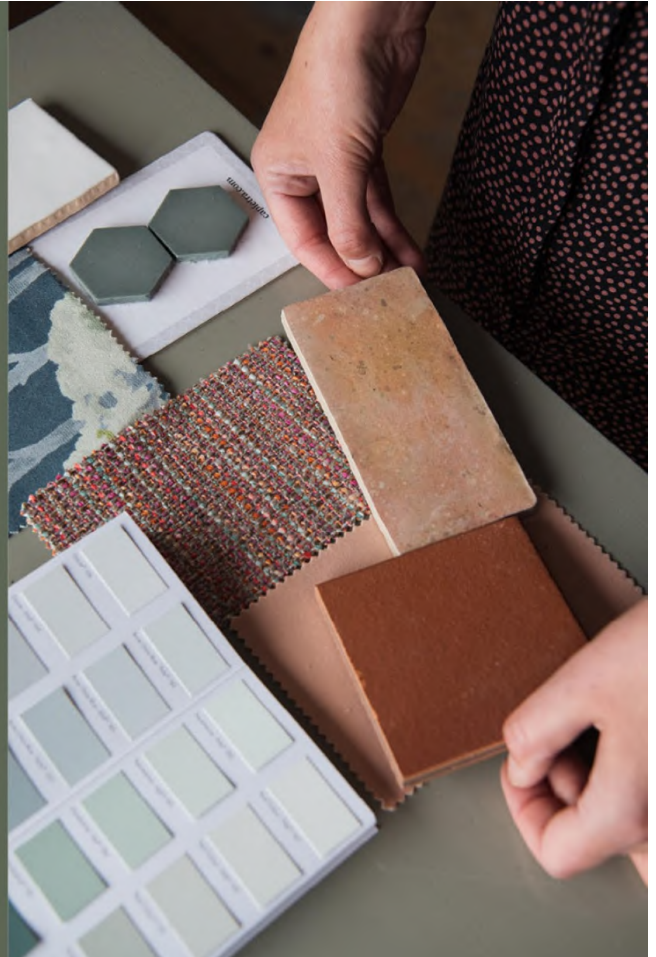
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
