


Rainfall

Yearly rainfall totals 2003-2022


November was the wettest November that I have recorded in the last 20 years. With 137.4mm (5.5") we had approaching twice the amount of rainfall as average. The previous wettest November was in 2009 when I recorded 129mm.

December was very slightly wetter than average with 76mm (3").

The yearly total of 684mm was 54mm (just over 2") less than average. The heavier than average monthly totals from September to December went a long way to balancing out the extremely dry June, July and August period.

One notable aspect of 2022 was the extreme heat which we experienced in July. Whilst it is not something I record normally, the max/min thermometer in the shade in the garden recorded a temperature of 38.2 degrees centigrade on 19th July which must have been a record.

Parish Council of Bugthorpe and Kirby Underdale

Minutes of the 158th Meeting of the Parish Council held at Bugthorpe War Memorial Institute on Monday 5 December 2022 Present: Councillors: K Robinson - Chair, T Atkinson, H Paul, S W Huffington, D J Lord - Clerk

In attendance: Ward Councillor D N Rudd **1. Apologies for Absence** were received from Councillors D J Pearson, Lady Halifax, F Goodhart and R Crow. In Councillor Pearson's absence Councillor Robinson took the chair

2. Minutes of the Meeting held on Monday 5th September 2022 were approved and signed as a true record by the Chair. 3. Declarations of Interest - the Parish Councils (Model Code of Conduct) Order 2001. Councillors Lord and Atkinson declared an interest in agenda item 4a. 4. Matters Arising from the last Meeting: a) Bugthorpe telephone box - Councillors noted that the total costs of the refurbishment were well in excess of the original estimates totalling £2,568.99. Councillor Atkinson explained that due to the poor condition of the fabric of the box. there was no alternative but to have it sand blasted. Two guotes were obtained for this, the lower of which was accepted. The glass was also expensive and the process time consuming. The Chair commented that a Parish Council contribution of £500 was agreed in 2019 and it would have been helpful for the Parish Council to be informed of the increased cost prior to the work being done. Councillors agreed that an excellent job had been carried out by Halifax Estates and that the box should now last for another 50 years. Councillor Crow had already confirmed his support for the proposal from Halifax Estates that the Parish Council should pay for the contractor cost and materials, with the Estate covering the Estate labour costs. Councillors Huffington and Paul, together with the Chair approved this Parish Council contribution of £1,115.10. b) Dog fouling in Bugthorpe & Kirby Underdale - in the absence of Councillors

Crow and Pearson, Councillor Atkinson said that he had not seen any dog fouling in Bugthorpe and the Clerk was unaware of any in Kirby Underdale.

c) Broadband - the Clerk reported on the meeting with Quickline on 18 November 2022. A questionnaire had been sent out by Halifax Estates and 29 responses were received. These were fed back to Quickline who admitted that there had been a particular problem at the end of August but that several fixes had been carried out in September which should have at least partially resolved the issues. Quickline will be installing new apparatus using 5G technology on the Garrowby Hill mast which should improve the signal to many customers. They are also reviewing the location of the repeater masts and considering updating the technology on these masts. Quickline had stressed that it was important for customers to report problems as soon as they arise, so the reason for individual problems can be identified immediately by the technicians. However, it had been pointed out to Quickline that customers had experienced problems getting through to Customer Services and this needs to be addressed by the Company. The Clerk confirmed that no progress had been made with BT Openreach on the installation of fibre to the unconnected areas. d) Water main bursts- the Clerk confirmed that he had written to Yorkshire water on 23 September regarding the regular bursts on the main between Bugthorpe and Kirby Underdale. He has not yet received a response so agreed to follow this up. Councillor Atkinson confirmed that the cast iron pipes are failing on the welds and it is likely to be an ongoing problem until they are replaced with plastic.

e) Jubilee Pasture- Councillor Robinson reported that the planting had now been done for this year. There are two piles of stones on site which will be positioned around the pond when ground conditions permit. The stone bench and information board are in hand and should be in place by Easter 2023. Councillor Robinson said that Dan Carne from the Woodmeadow Trust had

given an interesting and informative talk at Kirby Underdale Village Hall on 14 November. This was relevant to Jubilee Pasture, which has a combination of trees and meadow. f) Defibrillators in Bugthorpe and Kirby Underdale- the Clerk confirmed that the software in both devices has been updated. g) Collapse of road surface on Barf Hill although the warning signs were erected shortly after the last Parish Council meeting, the Highways Department have not yet confirmed when the work will be carried out. Councillor Atkinson was of the opinion that this problem had been caused by tree roots. h) Positioning of 30 mph signs on Stephenwath Lane - the Traffic Management Department at East Riding of Yorkshire Council have confirmed that Parish Council and street lighting needs to be extended before the 30 mph signs are moved. Councillor Rudd clarified the fact that for a 30 mph speed limit to be legally enforceable the signs need to be illuminated by street lighting. The Clerk pointed out that the speed limit was introduced after the street lights were installed and he therefore questioned why East Riding of Yorkshire Council and Humberside Police agreed to the speed limit if the signs were inadequately illuminated. Councillor Rudd agreed to discuss this further with Traffic Management, as even if the signs are only a deterrent to drivers, they should be positioned further away from the school gate. The Clerk also mentioned the 30 mph signs on the road towards Kirby Underdale which are also too close to the edge of the village, as drivers tend to speed along the straight between Bobby Hill and the village. The Chair mentioned that there is an unofficial sign at Jessbrook which she thought was effective. Councillor Atkinson agreed to speak to the Head Teacher at Bugthorpe School regarding the possibility of the children designing some signs for erection at all four entrances to the village.

i) Kirby Underdale Village Hall refurbishment-Councillor Atkinson confirmed that a programme of work had been prepared and costed. The cost will be shared between the Kirby Underdale Village Hall Committee and Halifax Estates. Kirby Underdale villagers have been having pop up cafes in the Village Hall on the last Saturday of each month to raise funds for the refurbishment and there are also residual funds from the COVID grant. The work is likely to commence in March 2023. Lord Halifax and his daughter Lady Joanna will be involved in the interior design and fit out.

5. Other Matters.

a) Parish Council precept 2023-2024 - after some discussion, Councillors agreed to the proposed precept of £4,200. The Chair and Clerk signed the precept form.

b) Approval was given for the following payments and cheques were signed by the Chair and Clerk:

Zurich Municipal (unchanged from last year) £257.60

G Sisson - half year bus shelter cleaning £60.00

Halifax Estates - Jubilee Pasture costs £5,076.76 (inc VAT)

Parish Pump £45.00

c) Retrospective approval was given for the payment of £36 to J Stringer for baling at Jubilee Pasture. Councillors also agreed to delegate responsibility for approval of future payments relating to Jubilee Pasture to Councillors Pearson, Robinson and Lord. These will not exceed the Lottery grant received.

d) Update of Model Standing Orders 2018 (England) - Councillors agreed to adopt the new version of the model standing orders. The Chair will put the new version on the Parish Council website.

e) Street light repair on Beck Row-Councillor Atkinson reported that the bulb had been replaced and it is now working.
f) Annual Rough Sleeper Survey 2022 - the submission of this survey was accepted as a matter of report.

g) Maintenance of Parish verges- The Clerk confirmed that following on from the Woodmeadow Trust talk, a discussion had taken place on the maintenance of the parish verges. ERYC cut a one metre wide strip of verge either side of the road twice a year for safety. However, to encourage the spread of wild flowers the rest of the verges should not be cut before late June or

July and the cuttings removed. However, by this time the verges have got quite long. The Clerk stated that this is a choice between tidiness and conservation. Councillors Paul. Atkinson and Huffington confirmed that they prefer tidy verges rather than overgrown. It was therefore agreed that further discussion on this matter would be deferred until a later meeting with more Councillors present. h) Christmas trees in Bugthorpe- Councillor Robinson reported that on Friday 2 December the lights on the trees at the Estate Office were switched on and children from the school sang. Refreshments were served at the Institute. Councillor Robinson expressed thanks to Halifax Estates for supplying the trees and to the Institute for arranging the refreshments and to the school for singing.

i) Community Litter Pick 2023 - Councillors were unanimously in favour of having another litter pick next year and agreed that March would be the right time. The Clerk agreed to arrange this.

6. Correspondence- the Chair asked about the Western Area Liaison meetings, which Councillor Rudd explained were arranged by the Ward Councillors. The main topics of debate during the meetings is speeding through villages and potholes.

7. Any Other Business

a) The Chair raised the fact that previously £150 had been allocated for the restoration of the Uncleby Tap, but this work has not been done. The Clerk and Councillor Atkinson agreed to inspect the tap and report back to the next meeting.

b) The Chair said that the Bugthorpe Village website domain name and hosting is costing £142.90, which is made up of two years hosting and year of domain fees. Councillors agreed to contribute £100 of this cost from the Jubilee Pasture fund as the village website has publicised this initiative. The balance of £42.90 will be paid by the Parish Council. The Chair paid these costs initially but has been reimbursed by the Institute Committee. Two invoices will therefore be issued by the Institute for reimbursement by the Parish Council.

c) Councillor Rudd confirmed that he has asked for an update from ERYC on the repair/replacement of the footpath bridge at Low Hall, Bugthorpe. He said that the officer dealing with this had moved departments and he was waiting for a response from the officer now dealing with it.

8. Date of Next Meeting

Some of you may remember that when I first came to Garrowby I agreed to stay for five years which would take me to April 2023. I was aware that by then I would be 68 and was unsure about my energy for what is a very enjoyable but also challenging appointment. As this date has grown closer, Mike and I have both felt that we want to stay and carry on the work in the Benefice and so I very much hope, health permitting, to stay until 2025. Thinking this through has led me to reflect on some of the weirder moments during my 27 years in ministry. People can sometimes think of clergy as a little different but our calling is very much to be alongside people like Jesus was, not to be "holier than thou". So I'd like to share with you a few stories which I hope will make you smile at a time when life can seem a bit grim. I also hope they will give you confidence to be in touch if something is bothering you or you just want a chat. Preaching is still something I enjoy but find challenging. In the early days my legs would shake under my cassock and I would trip over my words. I once tried to say organism but missed out the "ni". People tried hard not to laugh.

And that's his wife!" Being one of the first generation of women priests made for some interesting comments. I was once asked at a birthday party to which I had turned up in my collar after an Easter evening service "When do you get your kit off?". I had thought they meant when could I relax after work, they actually thought I was a stripper gram! I was also walking through York and a street musician dropped his flute on seeing me commenting "I've never seen one like you before".

Serving as a priest has been an enormous joy and privilege and I hope I have been able to show to others something of God's love that has sustained me through some tough as well as good times. I hope I am able to carry on doing so for many years to come. Please note, from half term onwards our days off will be Monday and Tuesday but please do not hesitate to contact me for any emergency on my mobile 07888 668663.

Guests: Members of the public 4 **203.** The Chair Welcomed the Parish Councillors, Ward Councillors members of and public, and explained the reason for the extraordinary meeting which was due to a planning application that required statutory review by the PC ahead of the next monthly meeting.

The meeting was temporally suspended to allow Members of Public to speak

All 4 members of the public spoke about the application, 3 who resided in the bungalows affected by the development due to the overlooking and overpowering nature of the 3^{rd} floor, and 1 who was the applicant, who clarified the reason for submitting a revised planning application which was due to an error in the original plans submitted, namely; A material change to the middle window, instead of being a small bathroom window as originally submitted, which has been constructed in a larger dimension. **206**. The chair re-opened the meeting and after much discussion and acknowledging that development of this property was felt to be overpowering but acknowledging concerns from members of the public were associated with the original planning permission which was granted. Today's review was purely around the decision on whether the middle window being bigger than planned should be approved. It was agreed that the clerk would write to the conservation officer with a list of concerns.

211. It was proposed by Cllr Rickatson and seconded by Cllr King that the minutes of the meeting held on the 24th October 2022 be accepted as a true record. Resolved. Cllr Sumpner abstained

212. It was proposed by Cllr Rigby and seconded by Cllr Sumpner that the minutes of

the extra ordinary meeting held on the 2nd November 2022 be accepted as a true record. Resolved

213.Ward Councillor's Report.

a) Cllr Rudd advised that all council owned car parks would be offering free parking on Saturdays and Sundays during December
b) Parking fines have increased by 50% over the last year

c) Still waiting for the budget settlement to be agreed in late December

d) Cllr Hammond advised that the Western Area Liaison meeting had been extremely positive and issues on traffic flows in villages had been discussed with both ERYC traffic management and the Police and Crime Commissioner. Community Speedwatch is the most affective way of controlling traffic speeds with a general reduction of 5mph. CSW groups asked for more support from the police. The police have now secured extra funding which has given 2 new officers, which has tripled the workforce. Funding has been applied for automated speed guns. e) Humber Forest have requested a meeting outside of the PC to discuss and agree plans and clarify quantity and location of trees. ERYC Highways are likely to adopt these trees so positioning is critical. Cllr Hammond to pursue.

f) Cost of living schemes are being rolled out by ERYC as demand dictates. £4 million has been set aside aimed mainly at people in work who do not qualify for other benefits.g) ERYC have asked the government to strengthen planning enforcement powers so that

i) breach of planning is an offence;

ii) once a planning enforcement is issued, all work must be stopped;

iii) fines can be imposed for breach of planning.

2. Clerk to arrange a site visit with ERYC personnel to discuss replacement of hard standing along with dropping of curb to allow pushchair and wheelchair access at the bus stops on the village green.

3. It was proposed by Cllr Sumpner and seconded by Cllr Haywood that the clerk draft letters to both planning and conservation officers regarding inappropriate applications for development within the conservation area being approved. Passed **215.** It was proposed by Cllr Haywood and seconded by Cllr Hammond that this Council do adopt the Bishop Wilton Parish Council Member Development Policy. Highways would be looking at the flooding issues on Hatkill Lane and other areas, to implement a flood alleviation scheme. The pot holes on Main St have been repaired. The broken footpath at Vale Crescent along with other pot holes in the village have been reported and are in hand. A local resident has offered to part fund a footpath linking Main St to Wolds Edge - the request to be placed on the agenda for the next meeting.

239. 4th May 2023 is election day. The clerk gave a brief overview that the public notice will go out on the 17/3 and nomination packs will be available from the 20/3. All


nomination forms must be hand delivered to ERYC County Hall no later than 4.pm on the 4^{th} April 2023. A new online pre-checking
