

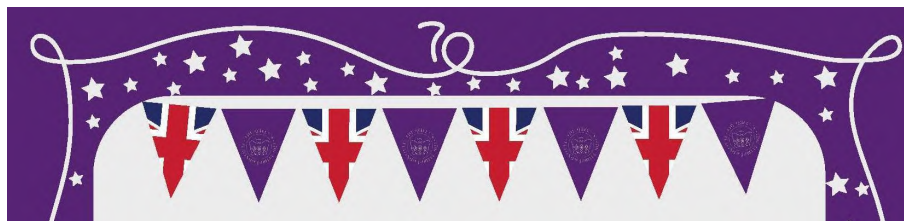

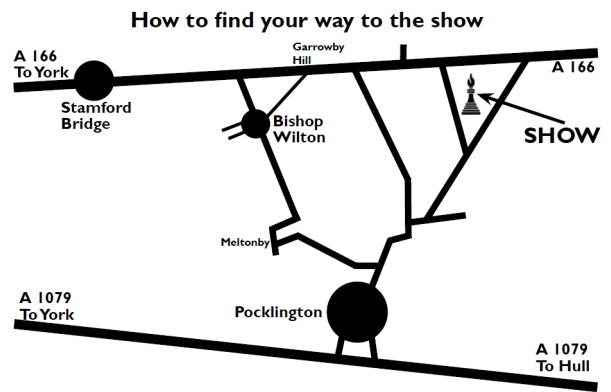

### Transition Days @Bugthorpe

Our new starters for September 2022 will be joining us on the following dates.

**Wednesday 15th June 9am - 12pm** - This is a morning session.

**Monday 27th June 9am - 1pm** - This is a morning session, which involves staying for lunch - yum! Our hot school dinner on this date is a pizza pasta bake, with vegetable sticks, sweetcorn, cupcake and milkshake.

**Wednesday 13th July 9am - 3:30pm** - This is a full day transition. An opportunity for your child to experience what life will be like and enjoy all that school offers. **The children will meet all the children that will be in their class as all of our classes in school will be moving up to their new teachers and classmates.**

### Pupil Voice Conference Feedback @Bugthorpe

The four areas we discussed were:

1. Reading books in school - are these boy heavy? Do the children enjoy the in-depth study of key books?
2. School Meals - how can we further improve uptake, especially in Summer term? Special meal days etc.
3. Eco Schools - How can we further improve our school grounds?
4. Ugandan School - What would you like to ask about the daily life of a child?

1. The children thought that all the stories we use linked well to the topics. They wanted to see more non-fiction books used. Classes are reminded that we have the Library Service books available each term, which the PTFA fund, which contain lots of non-fiction books to look at.

2. Lots of children suggested a move to a sandwich option available in the summer term. This is something we are looking into. We have put in place the Themed Thursday, where classes chose the menu for that day.

Portion sizes for KS2 were discussed; we always endeavour to provide seconds for KS2 children, if any food is left. We are also looking into a salad bar option with cold pasta. The children wanted to invite families in to school to share a meal; we are looking at getting some dates together for this.

3. The children wanted a climbing frame in the school grounds as well as mini football goals and a race track! They want more fruit trees and a few benches positioned around the school grounds. They are keen to add a water butt.

4. We had some brilliant questions, including: Do you have bath toys? Do you have options for school dinners? What struggles do you experience? Do you like where you live, if not, where would you like to live?

# THE BISHOP WILTON COMMUNITY SHOP & CAFE

## MANAGING INFLATION

In the year to March 2022, overall food price inflation was around 6%. We have been able to restrict our price increases to customers in the same period to less than 3%.

Although there are bound to be further increases over the coming months, we are working hard to buy more smartly and absorb cost price increases whenever we can. We are supported by great local suppliers in this, also trying to minimise how much they have to pass on to us.

We are also focussing a bit more at the moment on opportunities to introduce more better value products (for example basic pasta, cereals, ice cream and cakes).

We haven't got the resources to do widespread short term offers and marketing to gloss over the underlying increases like the supermarkets do, but instead are focussing on trying to provide better overall value for money and convenience. We hope that for locals using the shop, the opportunity for less waste and using less petrol is also increasingly helpful.

Whilst we are experiencing other cost pressures (particularly electricity!), the great work by all our volunteers means our total costs are relatively low. This, combined with our community status, puts us in a better place to manage future inflation and still at least break even. Please rest assured that although we will need to continue to pass some of the increases on, we will absorb others whenever we can.

We will continue to monitor our prices against other local small shops (to ensure we continue to be as cheap or cheaper) and the more major supermarkets. In many cases our prices are lower or the same as the likes of Sainsbury's, even before taking into account the petrol/delivery costs.

If there are any particular products you would like us to get in the shop, or any ideas you have for things we could be doing differently to support our customers through these challenging times please let us know.

## CLEANING VOLUNTEERS NEEDED

Keeping the shop clean and tidy is an ongoing task. Alongside regular cleaning done by Ruth, we have a small happy band of cleaning volunteers who come along every month to help keep the dust at bay. The team could do with a few extra pairs of hands to keep the work easily manageable. The cleaning is done after closing between 6pm and 8pm, in two shifts of one hour, so the commitment is only an hour each month. It's not heavy cleaning (unless you feel like an extra challenge!) - it is mostly concerned with moving products, cleaning the shelving, then moving the products back in position. Team members usually focus on just one aisle during their cleaning shift - rest assured you wouldn't be doing the whole shop! It is also very sociable as we take the chance for a good catch up with each other as well.

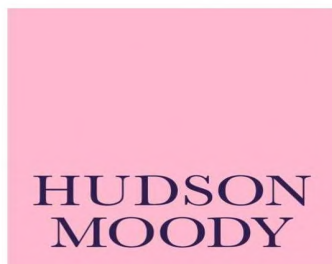

**From Mike:** As Head of State the Queen has to abstain from making her personal views known, especially as they relate to political issues. Her public statements on matters of public policy have to reflect the views of the Government of the day. This rightly fits with our informal constitution. Yet sometimes her views become known and when they do it is her usual reticence that makes them especially powerful. This was the case in both her address and subsequent reflection on the climate conference, COP 26 where she encouraged world leaders to work “side by side” to tackle the climate emergency and rallied them with the words “The time for words has now moved to the time for action”. Powerful words. But the subsequent comments that were not intended for public consumption reflected some of her own feelings about these matters “It’s really irritating when they talk, but they don’t do”. As we celebrate the Platinum Jubilee we are challenged not only by the Queen’s words but by the words and actions of many members of the Royal family to put green issues at the forefront of our response to the celebrations. The tree planting in the villages and in the churchyards is a great example of this. Also the care we take in how we use power in our homes can aid the overall carbon footprint of our villages. Since moving to Garrowby I have become increasingly conscious of our interdependence and especially of the debt we owe to our farmers in caring for our land and making sure there is fresh food in the shops. We dare not take this for granted. The impact of climate change as I write this is being seen in heat waves across India and in the loss of glaciers and increasing desertification bringing in its wake famine and drought.



After Christening and Confirmation by the Bishop of Selby

The Queen also sets us an example to see our common humanity and our responsibility to those who may live a long way away. Her commitment to the Commonwealth is well known:

“Gratitude, respect and pride, these words sum up how I feel about the people of this country and the commonwealth”.

“Family does not necessarily mean blood relatives but often a description of a community, organisation or nation.”

Each time I celebrate Holy Communion in the villages I take the bread and wine and remember the world around us that gave grain and grapes and also the work of the farmers who cultivated the land and those who produce and distribute our food. My personal prayer is that when all of our celebrations are over we will take from them a renewed commitment to care for the world around us and all the people in it as we have seen so powerfully during the reign of Queen Elizabeth through her own example and that of other members of the Royal family. Yet to do so with a real sense of humility, so the Queen has to have the last word:

“But let us not take ourselves too seriously. None of us has a monopoly of wisdom and we must always be ready to listen and respect other points of view.”

With regard to the total precipitation that we've received in 2022; so far we are just over an inch (31mm) less than could be expected in a "normal" year. However, this isn't particularly unusual and compares to the driest similar period in 2015 with 98mm and the wettest similar period in 2016 when we had 342mm.

## **Local History - Remembering Eileen Hopper 1915 - 2005**

Jack Danby paid Eileen Hopper a fitting tribute in 1990 in his book, "Enjoying More of Lesser Known East Yorkshire". Writing about Bishop Wilton and St Edith's Church, he said:

"The whole interior of the church is kept beautifully clean by the voluntary helpers, some of whom were busy when last I went inside. I was introduced to Eileen Hopper in her home in part of the old vicarage beside the church. She was at work polishing some of the church brass candlesticks, just part of the routine help she has freely given to St Edith's week by week for well over forty years.

That must be some sort of record! Benefactors like members of the Sykes family are well commemorated, we seldom hear enough about the Eileen Hoppers of this world."

Eileen lived just a few doors away from where I was brought up near the church gates and was my mum Dorothy's best friend. Eileen was a treasury of information about people and past events in the village. She was often consulted when researching articles for the local history group and for fitting names to faces on old photographs. It is known she was born in 1915 as Eileen Humberstone in Leeds but she told me she was adopted by the Jordan family and took their name. She married Johnny Waterson in 1935 when she lived at Yapham Mill and was a keen player in the Yapham Ladies Cricket Team. John was a driver for bailey's buses as was her later husband Percy Hopper who she married in 1973 following the death of her husband John in 1968. Her father John Jordan was a native of Kilham, Mr Jordan had lived in the Bishop Wilton district for about 50 years. For many years he was employed by the Sykes family, of Sledmere, and was manager on several of their farms at Eddlethorpe and those in the Bishop Wilton district. He always stated that he had lodged the Italian workers who placed the beautiful Mosaic floor in Bishop Wilton Church when it was restored by the late Sir Tatton Sykes many years ago. Older residents will also remember Eileen's brother Ron Jordan (also adopted by John Jordan) who lived in South Lane and who was married to Helen. He died in 2001 aged 81.

Eileen gave me a precious old photograph of the old hall in Bishop Wilton next to the church and it appears in the history group bulletins. The photograph has been deposited in the Beverley Treasure House. Some of Eileen's newspaper clippings and Bishop Wilton old photographs and memories will appear in a new book to be launched at a History Day in the Village Hall on October 15<sup>th</sup>. The book will consolidate all the articles in the Bishop Wilton History Group 20 bulletins we produced over the 10 years of its existence and will be a superb reference on the history of the village.

Both options cover working with Hull City Council, to obtain funding and support from central government for large projects that affect and ultimately benefit our region. The county deal is a pilot scheme and a decision will need to be made by late 2023 or early 2024

Cllr Stathers left the meeting at 7.41pm and the full Parish Council meeting began

**72.** The chair welcomed councillors and guests, and received apologies from Cllr Haywood; Cllr Hammond and Cllr Sangwin. Cllrs Kress and Rickatson were absent. In the absence of Cllr Haywood Cllr Rigby chairs the meeting.

**73.** Code of Conduct: Declaration of Interest received: Pecuniary - Cllr Sumpner item 6 (d) in relation to the community shop and the proposed community trust: non-pecuniary - Cllr King agenda item 14 re village hall; Cllr Rudd has an interest in the planning applications as he sits on the East Riding planning committee

Granting of dispensations - none

**74.** Open Forum: The meeting was temporarily suspended to allow for a period of public participation - no comments

**75.** It was proposed by Cllr Sumpner and seconded by Cllr King that the minutes of the meeting 16<sup>th</sup> February 2022 be accepted as a correct record. Passed

**76.** Ward Councillor Rudd offered a brief report on:

a) The opportunities available from the Community Pay back scheme

b) The increase in Covid cases in the area, and booster jabs will be widely available from September

c) The £150 grant to help with energy bills is available to all households with a council tax band of D or less, and the easiest way to benefit is by paying your council tax by Direct Debit

d) The council tax increase which is mainly to cover additional social care costs

Following a brief background given to this application, it was proposed by Cllr Rigby and seconded by Cllr King that no objections be raised for this application. Passed. Cllr Sumpner abstained.

A further planning application has been received which was heard, at the chair's discretion, to save the cost of holding an extraordinary meeting.

21/02973/PLF Proposal: Erection of a dwelling and detached double garage (AMENDED PLANS) Location: Land East of the Old Joiners Shop, Worsendale Road, Bishop Wilton, YO42 1ST Applicant: David Lord. Application Type: Full Planning Permission. The original application was heard in August 2021 and strong objections were raised, and a request was made for the application to be referred to committee. Having reviewed the amended application Cllr Sumpner has visited the site, and spoken to neighbouring property owners. The proposed development will block light to neighbouring property and gardens, and is

It was proposed by Cllr King and seconded by Cllr Hammond that any additional finance support required would be met from PC funds. Cllr Haywood advised that a road closure notice had been submitted and that a strip of grass had already been cut on the green for resident's safety.

**99. Finance:**

b) It was proposed by Cllr Haywood and seconded by Cllr King that the accounts to date be approved. Passed

**100. Community Issues:** councillors to report any relevant issues to the council.

It was agreed that there will be generally a no cut policy in May for the village green with first cut to be no earlier than end of May beg of June. A working party to be formed to pick up grass cutting before the Jubilee weekend.

Cllr King advised that the benches on the green are too near the road and a safety issue for pedestrians alighting from the bus, and need to be set further back. It was proposed by Cllr King and seconded by Cllr Haywood that this be actioned. Passed

**101. Correspondence:** to note the correspondence received since last meeting.

a) After further discussion it was agreed that planting a tree corridor along Braygate would be an acceptable choice. Type of trees, quantity and costs to be discussed further. Cllr Hammond advised that the Humber Forest scheme are awarding grants of up to £5k. Notices are to be posted on the notice boards and web site, asking if anyone has any objections , and Cllr Hammond to put a brief survey on social media.

b) Email from resident for freedom of information request concerning planning application 21/00872/PLF has been dealt with and all information has been copied and posted.

c) A Request has been received from resident for a litter bin on The Balk. It was proposed by Cllr Hammond and seconded by Cllr Sumpner that 2 bins be procured one for the Balk and one for Braygate/Kirkham Lane. Passed

d) t was agreed to respond to NALC request for issues facing smaller councils on green issues and small precepts.

Objections were raised on the grounds that 3 properties are overdevelopment. The proposal is out of character with other properties within the village and whilst the dog kennels will benefit from being demolished, one replacement dwelling would be more appropriate.

**Proposal:** Change of use from stables to ice cream

parlour with associated parking

**Location:** Land and Outbuildings at Livery Stables High Belthorpe, Belthorpe Lane, Bishop Wilton; YO42 1SB. **Applicant:** On the Shire. **Application Type:** Full Planning Permission.

Objections were raised on potential traffic issues as the road leading up to the site is a single track road and not made up as not part of the public highway.

**c) Planning Application 22/ 01308/STPLF**

**Proposal:** Temporary use of land for the storage of soil in connection with the construction of a prison on land to the west of HM prison Full Sutton Moor Lane Full Sutton. **Location:** Land to the west of HM Prison Full Sutton YO41 1PS

No objections in principle but would like to see landscaping included as a condition, in order to hide the soil mound from the village.
