

#### **Beck and Bells Update**

By now you'll have noticed that the church clock has fallen silent again. This is because work on the bells will start soon, so the clock had to be stopped and covered



beforehand to protect it. We've been having a bit of a spring clean in the tower and we had a bat survey organised through Natural England. Although there is evidence of a few bats passing through the tower there isn't a roost in the tower or spire, which means we can go ahead without causing any disturbance.

The bellhangers plan to start the project in the week beginning 10 October. If all goes to plan they will be taking down the bells and working on them in the tower for a few days, taking the fittings back to their workshop and returning about a month later to rehang the bells. Once this is done the clock will be restarted, we hope in time for Christmas. For safety reasons access to the church might be restricted while work is going on in the church. We will put a notice on the church gates and post any updates on the Bishop Wilton Facebook page.

Sadly it isn't possible for the bells to be brought out of the tower but we're going to film the work and, all being well, we'll live-stream the second phase so that it can be seen in real time. More details to follow.

The PCC and Bishop Wilton School are working together to involve the children in lots of ways, including learning to use handbells, which we are buying through our Heritage Fund grant.

Because the work won't be done in time for Guy Fawkes' night we are thinking of having a 'ringing day' in the new year. We hope that we can establish a team of volunteers to ring the bells, either by hand or using the electronic system.

#### Bishop Wilton Heritage Weekend (8th-9th October)

The history of Bishop Wilton is the focus of our heritage weekend with the objective to raise money for St. Edith's fabric fund. Thanks to the efforts of the Churchwardens and the PCC, a successful bid was made to the Heritage Lottery fund which has enabled the cost of the weekend to be covered. We have consolidated all the research of the Bishop Wilton Local History Group which was active for 10 years in 2002-2012, and created a prestigious keepsake book of 420 A4 pages. This will be on sale during the weekend with all proceeds for the Church funds.

The weekend will include an exhibition display using the archive material of Mike Pratt (BW history group Chairman) which has been in store since his death. We will focus on 100 years of Bishop Wilton WI, Bishop Wilton Show, W L Fishers, the 1928 cricket match, old photographs of people and the village and a history group project of fitting people to houses in 1901.

At 2pm each day will be a short guided tour of the village starting at the village hall. Taking in the Archbishop's Palace, the Church gates, the old Hall, Fisher's Corner, the vicarage and Worsendale Road and back to the start point.

At 6.30pm each evening will be a film show of Bob Sefton's unique old footage of the village taken in the late 1950's, and later cine film showing the Queen's Silver Jubilee in 1977. It will be the last opportunity to view his old film footage.

Refreshments will be available and entry is free with optional donations welcome.

#### Update from Uganda @Bugthorpe @Sutton

Both of our schools held a Bring and Buy Sale, raising £330. Professor Katie flew out in June 2022 and used the money to buy resources locally in Kampala. With our funds, she managed to provide the school with 576 exercise books, 288 pencils, 200 pens, 144 colouring pencils, 24 pencil sharpeners, a printer for the teachers to



print assessments for the children, ink cartridges and 2000 sheets of paper for printing. We also secured 8 footballs (1 for each class and a high quality tournament ball), ball pumps and cones for goals! It is safe to say that these were really appreciated and will be well used.

We are very proud of the difference our school communities have made to the lives of others and are eagerly awaiting the return video of 'a day in the life of a Nyabyeya child' and the return questions for us to answer.

When the former Prime Minister, John Major, was interviewed about his recollections of our late Queen, he spoke about the way she was able to take the long view. Even when present circumstances seemed really challenging and hard to navigate she would remind him that the daffodils will still bloom in the spring. It was her way of pointing out that even in the direst of times, there is a hope that is almost woven into the very heart of who we are because it mirrors what we see in nature.

At this time of the year we can look around and see the seasons changing. The first signs of autumn seemed to come early as a result of the drought over the summer, and as I write this there is already the first chills in the air on a morning. This sense of change is mirrored in our Harvest festivals when we give thanks for the produce of the past year and those who work so hard to care for the land and the animals across our villages. It has been an especially challenging year for our farmers and Harvest is a great time to not only give thanks to God, but also to express our appreciation to all those who ensure we can have food on the table. But our Harvest celebrations come as we see the trees shed their leaves and the days shorten. The celebrations of Halloween, All Saints, All Souls and Guy Fawkes have their origins long before there was a gun powder plot. Our forebears would have had "bone fires" at this time of year and parties to use up produce that wouldn't over winter. It was a time when ancestors would have been remembered. We continue this tradition remembering those who have died in the feasts of All Souls but also those who have inspired countless people down the centuries in the feasts of All Saints. We also give thanks for the sacrifice of so many during our Remembrance Services on the 13<sup>th</sup> November. Whilst All Hallows Eve, the eve of All Saints can be fun with lots of dressing up it can also be a chance to remember that darkness does not have the last word.

Although we may have lost someone we love, that they go on in our memories and in eternity, that although we may face really difficult times there is still the light shining in the pumpkin lanterns and in our hearts as we remember our loved ones and the love they shared with us. The autumn equinox, when the darkness moves to become longer than the light is really the trigger in nature for these reflections in our own hearts but, like the Queen, we can draw strength from the fact that though the land seems to sleep it is preparing for the coming of spring, of new life and new hope, the days will lengthen again at the spring equinox and the daffodils will bloom and that no matter what challenges we face, hope and light always have the final word.


#### St. Mary's Skirpenbeck

#### Rainfall

Rainfall report for July and August 2022. July rainfall 36.1mm Average rainfall July (2003-2022) Bishop Wilton 63.2mm August rainfall 15.6mm Average rainfall August (2003-2022) Bishop Wilton 77.3mm Rainfall for 2022 Jan-August 307mm. Average rainfall Jan-August (2003-2022) Bishop Wilton 472mm


July was a very much drier month than could be expected, with 36mm of rain. This is the second driest July I have recorded after 2013 when 23.5mm fell, and is just under 60% than the average.

August was the driest August I have recorded in the 20 years that I have been taking measurements with only 15.6mm of rain which is only 20% of the average August rainfall. The previous driest August was in 2003 when 18mm fell.

The August figure also provides us with a total of 76.7mm for the summer months of June, July and August. This is much less than an average summer of 206mm and is the driest summer that I have recorded. The previous driest summer was in 2018 when 84mm fell.

Looking at the rainfall totals so far for 2022 this has been the driest January to August period that I have recorded in my 20 years of measurements. We have received 307mm (12.25") precipitation compared to an average of 472mm (19"). The wettest comparable time period was 620mm (nearly 25") in 2014.

Minutes to the meeting of Bishop Wilton Parish Council, held on Monday 25<sup>th</sup> July 2022 at 7.00pm at Bishop Wilton Village Hall.

Present: Cllr Paul Rigby (Chairman); Cllr I Rickatson (Vice Chair); Cllrs Leo Hammond; V Kress; S King; R Sumpner; J Sangwin; S Berry Guests: Ward Cllr D Rudd; Committee member from Poor Lands Trust; 2 members of the public 146. The chairman welcomed both members and guests and accepted apologies from Cllr Haywood 147. Code of Conduct: Declaration of Interests were received from members as detailed.

Pecuniary - None. Non-pecuniary - Cllr Hammond on all planning applications in his capacity as a member of planning committees at East Riding Council. Cllrs Rigby and Rickatson on agenda item 17 planning applications. No dispensations were granted.

7.07 pm - The meeting was temporarily suspended to allow for a period of public participation.

An issue was raised regarding inappropriate parking in the village causing an obstruction to farm vehicles, and/or lack of visibility for other road users. Cllr Hammond to approach the Village Hall Committee for free use of their car park by visitors to the village.

The chair requested that item 10 on the agenda be moved forward and heard now. Agreed. The representative from The Poor Lands Trust gave a brief history of the trust. The trust committee is traditionally made up of 2 members of the PCC, and 2 members of the PC. The charity was formed in 1726 after land was gifted to the village. 3 fields are in countryside stewardship one of which has SSSI status; 23.17 acres in total. The charity supports primarily widows and widowers in the parish and last year gifted £60 per head to 30 parishioners. For future reference the Trust will present an annual report at the Councils AGM.

Cllr Rigby thanked the representative for his time and information, and for the charities work and efforts in managing the land, on behalf of, and in support of the parish.

pm Meeting reopened

**148**. It was proposed by Cllr Kress and seconded by Cllr Sumpner that the minutes of the meeting held on the 27<sup>th</sup> June 2022 be accepted as a correct record. Passed.

149. Ward Councillor's Report.

Cllr Rudd advised that there are some changes

being made within the ERYC with staff, recruitment and pay increases. The Council continues to work on flooding issues within the authority and is working on reducing carbon emissions and implementing their climate change policies by installing solar voltaic panels on council buildings and a solar farm at Bridlington South Shore, along with installation of electric vehicle charging points in public car parks. Free parking will be available on Saturdays and Sundays during the month of December and on Remembrance Sunday at all County owned car parks, this concession to be implemented for 3 years. ERYC are also conducting another review on communications and are encouraging feedback; closing date is the 2<sup>nd</sup> September. Cllr Hammond advised that defects on the road surface at Park Lane had been reported to ERYC. The issues with prison transport travelling through Gowthorpe and Youlthorpe, due to the theft of BT cabling along the A166, has been resolved, and all vehicles are now being tracked by the MOJ and are advised to travel via Pocklington. Residents should continue to report any further issues or sightings of lorries passing through their villages.

ERYC have now offered a wheelie litter bin at Poor Lands as an alternative to a standard bin. Cllr Hammond has contacted Humber Forest re the tree planting along Braygate. Now need to consult further with Highways due to the road being used for agricultural traffic. ERYC will advise on best way of consulting with landowners.

The sign at the crossroads with Belthorpe Lane is broken - Cllr Hammond to report to Public Rights of Way.

- **150.** Matters Arising: update on outstanding items from previous meeting.
- a) The update on the tree planting project was covered in Cllr Hammond's report. The engagement with stakeholders being postponed until more details of the quantity and type of trees has been determined. Meanwhile there is a need to put a call out to private landowners for land
- b) The end of project report form in respect of the Jubilee Funding is near completion and it was proposed by Cllr Rickatson and seconded by Cllr Kress that a request be made for the surplus funds to be used for the purchase of a village Christmas tree. Passed.

- **1. Apologies for Absence** were received from R Crow, D Birks, K Robinson and T Atkinson.
- **2. Minutes of the Meeting** held on Monday 23 May 2022 were approved and signed as a true record by the Chair and Clerk.
- **3. Declarations of Interest** The Parish Councils (Model Code of Conduct) Order 2001. There were no declarations of interest.
- 4. Matters Arising from the last Meeting:
- a) Bugthorpe telephone box the Clerk reported that the telephone box is currently being repaired in the Joiners Shop at Garrowby Sawyard.
- b) Dog fouling in Bugthorpe & Kirby Underdale the Clerk said that he had not received any reports of dog fouling in Bugthorpe from Councillor Crow. The Chair also confirmed that he had not received any reports of incidents in Kirby Underdale.
- c) Potholes the Clerk informed Councillors that the jet patching machine had recently completed repairs on all the potholes throughout both parishes. The extremely poor condition of the Main Street through Kirby Underdale and Painsthorpe Hill were noted by the Area Highways Engineer, who confirmed that he would promote this as a capital scheme for East Yorkshire Borough Council to undertake in the 2023-24 financial year. The discussion was then widened to discuss the issue of the large number of bursts on the water main between Bugthorpe and Kirby Underdale and the detrimental effect that the resulting repairs are having on the road surface.

The significant number of repairs indicate that the water main is in need of replacement and the Clerk agreed to contact Yorkshire Water to establish whether a scheme for replacement is planned.

d) Jubilee Pasture - in Councillor Robinson's absence the Chair and Clerk reported that a significant amount of work has been carried out on Jubilee Pasture including the excavation of the pond, the spreading of wild grass/ flower seed and the scattering of green hay from Martin Stringer's wild flower meadow in Nunburnholme. Full details of the works carried out have been put onto the Bugthorpe Village website by Councillor Robinson.

The Chair informed Councillors that it is hoped to arrange a public meeting at Kirby Underdale Village Hall probably in October or November, at which the Woodmeadow Trust will be invited to speak. The information board and bench will be in situ by the spring.

- e) Pedestrian bridge across beck at Low Hall Bugthorpe - Councillor Rudd agreed to chase this up again to establish which engineer will be dealing with it and the timing of the work.
- f) Kirby Underdale Village Hall refurbishment the Clerk informed Councillors that a refurbishment scheme will be undertaken over the next few months jointly funded by Halifax Estates and the Village Hall Committee. A pop up cafe has been set up by the villagers on the last Saturday of each month during the summer to raise funds for the refurbishment.
- g) Defibrillator signs the installation of these was accepted as a matter of report.
- 5. Other Matters.
- a) Defibrillator and Basic Life Support training the Chair reported that approximately 20 parishioners attended the two training sessions in Bugthorpe and Kirby Underdale. The sessions

were useful and the Ambulance Service was happy with the level of attendance.

- b) A cheque in the sum of £95.88 was signed by the Chair and Clerk to reimburse Halifax Estates for the replacement pads purchased for the defibrillators. The Clerk advised that both defibrillators have been recalled for a software update and will be away for three days commencing on 27 September 2022.
- c) Village Walkabout 9 August 2022 the Clerk reported that he conducted the walkabout with three representatives of East Riding of Yorkshire Council. A schedule of the work to be undertaken has not yet been provided by ERYC. The extremely poor condition of the Main Street and the Church hill was noted, hopefully it will be included on the capital scheme for resurfacing together with Painsthorpe Hill (see 4c above).
- d) Broadband The Clerk said that although BT Openreach have said that the properties not connected to fibre should hopefully be eligible for the Future Fibre Scheme roll out, there is absolutely no guarantee and the timing is also unknown. Councillors agreed that this is very unsatisfactory situation. The Chair and Clerk are to arrange a meeting with Rebecca Oddy of Halifax Estates to discuss a way forward.
  e) Retrospective approval was given for the following Jubilee Pasture expenses (Lottery grant of £9,984 in the Parish Council account). Friends of the Lower Derwent Valley Conservation Group Wild grass and flower seed £150. J M Stringer Green hay £45.

#### 7. Any Other Business

Councillor Lady Halifax mentioned the 30mph signs next to Bugthorpe Primary School entrance. She expressed her opinion that these should be further away from the school entrance to ensure that drivers slowed down well before the school. She also questioned why it was not a 20mph limit close to the school as it is in other villages. Councillor Rudd confirmed that a 20mph speed limits are not enforceable, but the Councillors agreed that the signs are a good deterrent. The Clerk agreed to contact ERYC about moving the signs further away from the school entrance and also about the possibility of 20mph signs. If ERYC were unwilling to impose a

20mph speed limit past the school, the Chair will speak to Mr Holtby at Bugthorpe School about the possibility of the pupils designing unofficial signs to display. The Clerk agreed to contact ERYC to arrange a meeting to discuss the speed limit and signs in the vicinity of the school.

- b) The issue of tractors speeding through the village was also discussed and the Clerk confirmed that the most recent incident had been addressed with the farm tenant in the village. The situation is to be monitored and dealt with on a case by case basis.
- c) Councillor Rudd confirmed that the next

- d) Councillor Rudd advised that Covid booster vaccinations are being carried out in the East Riding for care home staff and residents. With effect from 12 September, residents aged 75 and over will be eligible for boosters.
- e) Councillor Rudd advised that ERYC have arranged a compost giveaway at 4pm on 12 September at Wolds Gliding Club in Pocklington. f) Councillor Huffington mentioned that the road surface on Barf Hill leading down to the A166 has subsided. The Clerk agreed to inspect this and then report it to the ERYC Highways Department.






