A Wilton Childhood Part One Norman Foster

As a typical Yorkshireman, my Dad always bemoaned the fact that I was born in January 1948 instead of later that year after the NHS had started. That would have saved my hard-pressed parents the fees for my birth. My timing has never been particularly good.

My Dad, Stan Foster, was from generations of families who had lived in, or local to, Bishop Wilton. After he met my Mum they lived in Leeds until, in 1946, the industrial Leeds smogs forced them back to Bishop Wilton due to my Dad's weak chest.

They initially lived in what were delightfully known as the Black Cottages down Back Lane. This had been a bit of a culture shock for my Mum, used to in-house facilities. In this bed-bug infested cottage there was just an outside earth loo and a shared outside water tap.

I have no recollection of Black Cottages but I do remember our brand-new council house at 11, Vale Crescent. Unfortunately, in spite of Mum supplementing my Dad's meagre wage as a labourer for Lord Halifax by cleaning jobs, they couldn't afford the rent. So, we moved down into the village to 83, Park View, owned by a lovely old lady who I always called Granny Boyes.

This was great for me as it was only yards from the school, meaning that I could delay leaving until the last minute. The head of the school was a wonderful Welshman called Ellis Owen. He was a great motivator and I remember lots of interesting lessons, particularly on history and literature.

As children we all played together. Sure, there was a bit of rivalry between the Crescent lads and the village crew but it was never serious and we would go off for the whole day with a pack-up lunch, making the most of the ability to access hundreds of acres of the Garrowby Estate. We played Fox-Off where one group would try and track-down another or Arrow Chase where one person would set an obscure trail to follow. Idyllic.

In the 1950s and early '60s we used to have real winters and Bishop Wilton's position and layout is tailor-made for brilliant sledging. As young

children we stayed in the village using the slopes of the banks down to the beck. As there were few cars then we also used the road hill from near the school down to the drive leading to what was

the Sissons' farm. This made it extremely dangerous to walk on and eventually someone would encourage the roadman, Sam, to put grit on. I always had the impression that he did it reluctantly, not wanting to spoil our fun.

Not to be beaten, we would graduate to the top of Worsendale Hill, "Wossy", until after a couple of days our run would be gritted.

Our most spectacular run was what we christened the Cresta. We started at the top of the hill behind Beechwood, then the home of Rt Hon Richard Wood, and travelled the length of the fence before turning down towards the beck. I reckon that whole track must have approached a quarter-mile in length.

We had a real mix of sledges. I remember that the Seftons always seemed to have the fastest ones, a small luge-like one and a really classy wooden job. Mine was one made by Hubert, the blacksmith who worked for Fishers. It was pretty heavy and took a bit to get going and even more effort to stop it.

Some children had really good homemade constructions. I remember a real barge-like wooden sledge made by John Cook to take his whole family. The problem with that one was that with several Cooks aboard it was nearly impossible to steer and I remember one spectacular pile-up where they ploughed into a tree. No one was hurt.

Bishop Wilton Table Tennis Club

We're an established PremierClub of Table Tennis England (TTE). Apart from club nights each Wednesday evening, we also play competitively against other clubs. Three times a week I run professional coaching sessions. To deal with additional demands of joining Ryedale Table Tennis League we needed experience.

Experienced committee members able to work as a team to the benefit of all, capable of making decisions to deal with increased financial challenges, including opening a club bank account. To achieve this, I took on the role of chairman and Kevin Prime was appointed treasurer. Kevin and I have a good knowledge of the game, playing to a high standard. We have coaching qualifications and many years of experience running sports clubs. To be eligible as a PremierClub of TTE the club has to meet the criteria, including having a qualified TTE coach and safeguarding officer. No one is more qualified in safeguarding than our third committee member Caroline Fuller whom many of you will know as a volunteer of the community shop and as a practice nurse at Pocklington Group Practice. We set a target of opening a bank account in the club's name and owning all our own equipment ASAP, including three good quality ITTF approved table tennis tables. We're succeeding in meeting targets. Five days after Kevin's appointment, the bank account was open, and instead of borrowing three tables we now own two. I'm working hard on bringing in a third. We've put fund raising initiatives in place. Profits earned through coaching sessions are donated to the club and I've introduced easyfundraising where members raise donations through online shopping. As a result we've already raised hundreds of pounds. Kevin has reorganised membership categories so members playing the most pay the most whilst juniors pay reduced rates. And we've introduced a membership ioining fee. Members meet for fun on Wednesday evenings and those wishing to play competitively can put themselves forward to be considered for selection. Membership numbers are above expectation and growing,



so we may add a second session on Wednesdays.

In August we were the guests of Amotherby TTC. Fourteen travelled from Bishop Wilton and it was a fabulous evening. In December we're doing something similar with Wilberfoss TTC. We also enjoyed a summer BBQ facing challenging weather, but with gazebo's, music, good food and company everyone had a great time. I was delighted to present Junior Member Thomas Leonard (pictured) with a trophy and prize for winning one of our tournaments. We encourage and support junior members, helping them to develop as players and we provide opportunities for them to play competitively. In preparation for the beginning of the table tennis season, the BW TT team has played seven friendlies, W4 D2 L1. Outstanding results against experienced league teams. We still have work to do, but my personal ambition when forming the club has been achieved. 'BW TT Club is available to everyone. There are no minimum standards. The very nature of table tennis allows inclusive participation. All ages, genders and abilities are now able to access sport in our community through Bishop Wilton Table Tennis Club.

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Rainfall

Rainfall report for July and August 2023.

July rainfall 166mm Average rainfall July (2003-2023) Bishop Wilton 68.1mm

August rainfall 76 mm Average rainfall August (2003-2023) Bishop Wilton 77.2mm

Rainfall for 2023 Jan-August 543.5mm. Average rainfall Jan-August (2003-2023) 530.3mm

The year of extremes seems to continue with this July being the wettest July I have recorded in 20 years. The 166mm (6.5") was more than double the 20 year average for the month and 42mm greater than the previous wettest July in 2008. It was the third wettest month of the 240 months worth of data after June 2007 (179.5mm) and August 2008 (178.5mm).

August was average with 76mm (3") of precipitation.

The August figure also provides us with a total of 289mm for the summer months of June, July and August. This is much more (3") than an average summer of 210mm.

According to my measurements this summer has been the fourth wettest summer of the last 20 years after 2007, 2008 and 2012 when I measured 318mm, 376mm and 299mm respectively.

Looking at the rainfall totals so far for 2023 we have had a basically average amount of rainfall with the unusually high and unusually low monthly totals balancing out the total amount.

Bishop Wilton Hall

The month of August is normally a quiet one at the hall with many of our regular users being on holiday.

That said there are still things going on which are worthy of a mention.

The toddler group which meets on a Monday morning have continued throughout the school holidays providing a useful activity at a time when many facilities for youngsters are closed. Many families have been seen using the swings and slides on the playing fields, others turning up for a kickabout on the MUGA, or shooting

some hoops on the basketball court.

Maintenance. 'There is always a job to do at the Hall.' New fencing has been installed at the entrance to the hall car park which has improved the appearance from Worsendale Road. There is a little more to do but we will get there in the end.

Dave and Trevor Lee have helped to sort out a drainage problem on the playing field. We will no longer have a "boggy patch" which the grass cutting team will need to avoid.

Two new stiles have been installed along the fence to Andrew Hutchinson's field, and a third existing one has been repaired. The stiles do not provide a right of way but are there merely to allow balls to be retrieved more easily.

New cricket practice nets have been installed thanks to a donation to the Cricket Club from James Goodhart.

A big thank you to the Gardening Club volunteers who recently tidied up our shrubs and borders.

An isolation switch on the Solar Panel system had to be replaced so the system was down for almost 3 weeks. It is back up and running now, and by the time you read this the system will have generated over one thousand kWh of electricity and over one thousand kg of CO2 reduced.

Finance. In our last article we outlined the

financial reality that, like everyone else, the Hall is not immune to the rise in inflation. The ONS (office for National Statistics) puts the inflation figure at 22.54% since 2021 when Hall hire charges were last revised.

The Trustees have unanimously agreed that the hire charges will go up from 1st January 2024. However, to increase the hire charges by the rate of inflation was deemed to be a nonstarter and would adversely affect all our users. Work is currently underway to develop new hire charges which are affordable.

To keep any price increase to a minimum we have already undertaken a few of the following

points and are striving to maintain the Hall so it can continue to be an asset that can be enjoyed by the whole community:

- Use third party funding to install solar panels to reduce energy costs at the hall.
- Install digital thermostats to make the heating of the hall more efficient.
- Work to attract new users to the hall, including businesses and organizations.
- Work with East Riding Council to find ways to support existing users.
- Work with existing users to explore ways in which they can increase participation.
- Work with East Riding Council to explore ways in which the hall can support the Activity, education, and Health outreach programmes.

We would also like to thank the Halifax Charitable Trust for making an unsolicited annual donation to the Hall.

And Last but not least..... A big thank you for all of those who turned out to wish Steve Swire a happy 76th birthday. As you know, Steve is not well. Going back to 2006 and before, Steve was the driving force behind the creation of the Bishop Wilton Hall and Playing Fields Association and building the new Hall which opened in 2010. The result is testament to his selfless dogged determination, and I am sure you will join us in thanking him and wishing him all the best.


Beck and Bells

Linda writes:

I am very lucky to have been granted a Sabbatical by the Bishop which means I shall be either away or keeping a low profile from Monday October 2nd and I will be back on duty on Wednesday November 15th. You will see below that there are very few changes to the pattern of services and I am grateful to Canons Val Hewetson and Rodney Nicholson for their help. I have also encouraged Mike to take some time for reflection during this time though he will be available during this time to cover any funerals or other emergencies and can be contacted on the Vicarage number.

As you can imagine, although my "job" is part time, being a priest is not, rather it is 24/7/365 which is why the church sets aside some time for study and reflection so that it is possible to come at preaching and teaching afresh.

The idea of "sabbatical" is actually built in to the creation story - God rested on the 7th day - and it is one of the 10 Commandments - to keep the Sabbath. Often this has been interpreted in negative terms - don't go shopping, don't do the washing, don't.....But actually there is great wisdom in having a time each day, each week and maybe through holidays each year to "take time" and live according to a different rhythm. A culture that seems to praise busyness and speed seems to have created huge numbers of people suffering from anxiety and depression because they can never unwind and take time.

Whilst I know myself to be very lucky to have this time, I would encourage all of you to look at how you can build a "sabbatical" into the rhythm of your life. It does us good at every level of our being and is not at all being lazy. It is honouring ourselves and those to whom we are close as tuning into ourselves and giving ourselves space actually gives us the capacity to really be there for others. If we are always thinking about the next thing on our to do list then we can't

really listen to a friend as their words are drowned out by the constant chatter inside our own heads.

I was advised by a Post Office authority some years ago that when I retired my contract would end and my successor would most likely be awarded a reduced hours contract based on the Post Office's low business traffic. The massively expanded Post Office portfolio and imposed accessibility obligation to support rural communities has considerably widened the goal posts and I have been reliably informed by the Post Office Provision lead, that my current contract will in fact transfer in its current form to my successor. This is wonderful news as without these hours the retail offering simply wouldn't survive. That burden is now lifted.

Modern technologies now dominate all aspects of our lives and as Post Office constantly develop new and interesting alliances to broaden their service provision, it needs a younger, flexible brain to embrace these changes and go forward. Even in Bugthorpe there are opportunities for a fresh prospector to revitalize the current offering. Remember, Post Office, and that includes Bugthorpe, now provides the counter for almost every bank who have closed their doors on the high street, and this is just one alternative option accessible in your local outlet, and there will be more following. Convenience will become even more convenient.

The joint quest of myself and Halifax Estates, as landlord of the shop and Post Office, to

find a successor has begun but it's early days and I'm optimistic these lines might stir some thought. For the right person or family, it's a unique opportunity to live and work from home at the foot of the great Yorkshire Wolds to provide continuity of service to surrounding villages and farming communities. You would be extremely fortunate to find a similar position anywhere else in this country.

I have another 18 months before that milestone arrives and will remain in post until then.


Bishop Wilton WI welcomes women of all ages. We are a friendly group, so why not come to a meeting as a guest and see what we're about and consider joining us!

Parish Council of Bugthorpe and Kirby Underdale

Minutes of the 161st Meeting of the Parish Council held at Kirby Underdale Village Hall on Monday 11 September 2023

Present: Councillors: D J Pearson (Chair), Lady Halifax, K Robinson, D Birks, R Crow, H T Paul, F Goodhart, T Atkinson, D Curtis, D J Lord In attendance: Ward Councillors Cary and West The Chair commenced the meeting by

- 1. The Chair commenced the meeting by welcoming Ward Councillors Cary & West.
- 2. There were no Apologies for Absence.
- **3. Minutes of the Meeting** held on Monday 15 May 2023 were approved and signed as a true record, by the Chair.
- **4. Declarations of Interest** the Parish Councils (Model Code of Conduct) Order 2001. Councillor Lord declared an interest in item 6d on the Agenda.
- 5. Matters Arising from the last Meeting: a) Jubilee Pasture - Councillor Robinson reported that the bench and interpretation board have now been installed and therefore the main items of expenditure are complete. A further extension has been agreed with the National Lottery until the end of November for completing the expenditure on the project. The Committee have agreed to arrange an event either in Bugthorpe or Kirby Underdale to explain the aims and objectives of the project and potentially to get an outside speaker to attend. The Bugthorpe School children will also be visiting during October to carry out some planting and hopefully they will be rewarded with ice cream. Councillor Robinson confirmed that there is one more volunteer event to be arranged this autumn. Councillor Lord confirmed that at the end of November there will be a balance of unspent grant to repay to the National Lottery.
- b) Dog fouling in Bugthorpe & Kirby Underdale Councillor Crow said that fouling is still continuing in Bugthorpe and this appears to be carried out by both small and large dogs, which have not been identified. The Chair said that dog fouling in the vicinity of School Farmhouse in Kirby Underdale occurs approximately once a week.
- c) Potholes the Clerk reported repairs have been carried out on York Lane. Councillor Paul mentioned that the roads in both parishes are generally in poor condition. It was recognised that budgetary constraints mean that it is unlikely that any major improvement schemes are going to be initiated in foreseeable future, with the possible exception of Painsthorpe Lane which Ward Councillor Hammond is attempting to facilitate.

d) Speed limit signs on Stephenwath Lane -Councillor Atkinson said that he planned to contact the Head Teacher at Bugthorpe School again to remind him about the signs, now the children are back from their summer break. e) Internet provision - the Clerk reported that he had hoped that the Quickline service would improve with the updating of the equipment on the MOD mast at Garrowby Hill and roll out of new technology on the repeater masts. However both the Chair and Councillor Goodhart confirmed that Ouickline service is substandard. with significant number of outages and poor customer service. Ward Councillor West agreed to make enquiries with the ERYC Broadband team to see what can be done about getting BT fibre to Kirby Underdale and surrounding properties that are not currently connected. He also mentioned that there is another fibre provider called MS3 which is using BT poles to distribute this service. The Chair commented that the proliferation of poles would be undesirable. The Clerk agreed to arrange another meeting with Quickline to express the current dissatisfaction with their service and to establish what their plans are to improve the situation. Councillor Goodhart said that BT are intending to discontinue their wired landline service within

Councillor Goodhart said that BT are intending to discontinue their wired landline service within the not too distant future and therefore the broadband speeds and reliability must be improved before this happens.

- f) Restoration of Uncleby Tap Councillor Atkinson confirmed that the repairs will be carried out during the week commencing 25 September 2023.
- g) Pedestrian bridge across Beck at Low Hall these repairs have been outstanding for at least 2 years although an ERYC Officer did come out to inspect the bridge probably 12-18 months ago. Councillor Birks confirmed how dangerous it is as there is a section without a guard rail and drop of approximately 10ft to the watercourse below. The Clerk is to send some photographs to Ward Councillor West who will chase this up with the relevant department.
- h) Kirby Underdale Village Hall refurbishment the Clerk confirmed that most of the work had been completed and that the new heaters were due to be fitted next week. The new curtains, additional pictures etc will then follow on. The Clerk confirmed that the cost of this project is to be shared between Halifax Estates and the Village Hall Committee and the Parish Council will have no financial involvement.
- i) Community Payback Project -it was agreed that the painting of the churchyard fencing at Bugthorpe and Kirby Underdale went well and several parishioners have commented on the improved appearance of the railings.

6. Other Matters.

- a) Clock Fund the current account balance is £3,665.87 and this money is going to be transferred from the existing Virgin Money Account to a Natwest Liquid Manager Notice Account which currently pays 2.96%, interest but requires 35 days' notice to withdraw monies. Councillor Crow confirmed that the only regular expense payment to lain Macdonald in the sum of £75pa for clock winding.
- b) Parish Council Clerk and responsible Financial Officer Role after May 2024. The Chair confirmed that the Clerk proposes to retire from the position in May 2024 after 34 years. For the whole time that the Clerk has held the position, he has done so on a voluntary basis and has therefore not been an employee of the Parish Council. This has allowed him also to be a Parish Councillor. An annual sum equivalent to the Clerk's salary has been paid to Halifax Estates for assistance with the administration function and costs in postage and photocopying. The option of employing a professional Clerk was discussed, but it was agreed that this would be more expensive and increase administration significantly. The Clerk's successor at Halifax Estates, Edward Johnson, has agreed to take over as voluntary Clerk in May 2024. He may then seek to be elected or co-opted to be a Parish Councillor in due course, when a vacancy occurs.
- c) Community Governance Review the Chair confirmed that the deadline for the comments on the proposal is now 30 September. The proposal for implementation in 2027 is that the two parishes of Bugthorpe and Kirby Underdale will be amalgamated, with two wards. It is also proposed that the number of Councillors should reduce from 5 to 4 for each ward. This matter was debated and it was agreed that the Parish Council would agree to the ward proposal but request that the total number of Councillors remain at 10, to avoid the difficulties if several Councillors could not attend a certain meeting. d) Planning and Listed Building Applications for School Barn, Kirby Underdale - Councillors inspected a drawing of the revised proposal and unanimously agreed that there was no objection
- e) The payment of £45 to the Bishop Wilton Parish Pump was approved and a cheque was signed by the Chair and Clerk.
- f) Salt bins in Bugthorpe & Kirby Underdale the Clerk confirmed that ERYC have replaced the salt bin on the junction between York Lane and Stephenwath Lane in Bugthorpe and have deemed the bin outside the Village Hall in Kirby Underdale to be serviceable. However, the timber salt bin on Beck Row, Bugthorpe is not on the ERYC list for replenishment and they have

refused to take responsibility for replacing the bin and filling it. Instead they have offered to replace the bin at a cost of £409 plus VAT and to fill it at a cost of £49 per visit. Councillors agreed to purchase a bin from an alternative supplier and to look at other alternatives for filling it. g) Cutting of Bugthorpe village green - the Clerk confirmed that the cutting of the Bugthorpe village green started very late this year as a result when it was cut there was a large quantity of grass left on top which looked untidy. Ward Councillor West said that the grass cutting had been delayed this year by wet weather and he expected that it would be started earlier next year.

7. Correspondence - Parish Councillor Atkinson said that he would bring to the attention of the Head Teacher at Bugthorpe School, the Holiday Activities and Food Grant Scheme (HAF) for eligible children and young people that are eligible for free school meals.

8. Any Other Business.

- a) Councillor Goodhart said that a number of parishioners have expressed concern about the travellers in the layby on the A166 who have a caravan, lorry and 3 cars. There have been there for a considerable time and are restricting access for lorries to park. Ward Councillor West confirmed that he would establish what the ERYC are proposing to do to move these travellers on. b) Councillor Robinson said that the footpath sign on Jubilee Pasture has disappeared. Clerk will ask ERYC to replace it.
- c) Stamford Bridge bridge repair Ward Councillor West said that the bridge is due to be closed during the spring of 2024 for a period of 7-9 weeks and there will be a diversion through High Catton onto the A1079. Councillors expressed concern about this and the inconvenience it will cause. Ward Councillor West that he would obtain an update on the exact timing and period of closure. There are two alternative long term solutions to the congestion at Stamford Bridge that are being considered by ERYC Council. One being a bypass and the other a secondary bridge to accommodate west bound traffic. Ward Councillor West agreed to send the Clerk details of the consultation.
- d) Ward Councillor West mentioned the East Riding Design Code aimed at assuring that harmonious and appropriate design is incorporated into Planning Policy. The consultation is due to end on the 22 October 2023 and there are events arranged at Pocklington on 19 September 2023 and Driffield 9 October 2023 to inform residents.

9. Date of Next Meeting.

The next meeting was fixed for 7pm on Monday 4 December 2023 at Bugthorpe War Memorial Institute.

The council have received a response from a member of the public in respect of Road Safety in Bishop Wilton along Garrowby Road (Centre of the village to Vicarage Lane), which is attached as an appendix to these minutes.

Cllr Hammond - has spoken to ERYC with regard to the village tree planting and an agreement has been reached with highways that a planting scheme will commence in November 2023, with 40 trees being a mix of lime, oak and beech being planted along Braygate. ERYC will plant and maintain these trees going forward, with further planting to be done in 2024.

Cllr West and Cllr Hammond gave an update on the Design Code, which is intended to sit alongside the Local Plan and give local councils the opportunity to be heard in how future developments in the parish should look in both appearance and structure. Proposed bridge repairs in Stamford Bridge will see road closure for up to 7 weeks.

The next round of the UK Shared Prosperity Fund will be open in October. Much of the first round of funding has gone to coastal areas as these are the most deprived, but funding is available to communities, supporting local businesses, skills training, creation and improvement of green spaces, and much more. Applications of interest

can be submitted prior to making a full application. The Community Governance Review draft recommendations which could see some changes to parish councils structure, after the next election in 2027, has still to be approved by ERYC before going out for consultation.

ERYC have received funding to help and improve bus services, and the 747 should see more services over the weekends.

7.23pm Cllr Sumpner joined the meeting. The Chair asked if Cllr Sumpner intended to take a personal recording of the meeting, Cllr Sumpner confirmed.

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
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
